
A Year in the Old West: Historical Happenings That Shaped a Legendary Era


Gold Rush

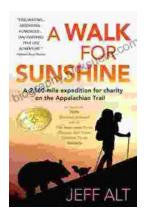


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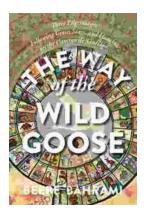
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
