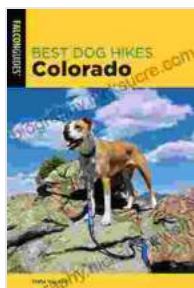

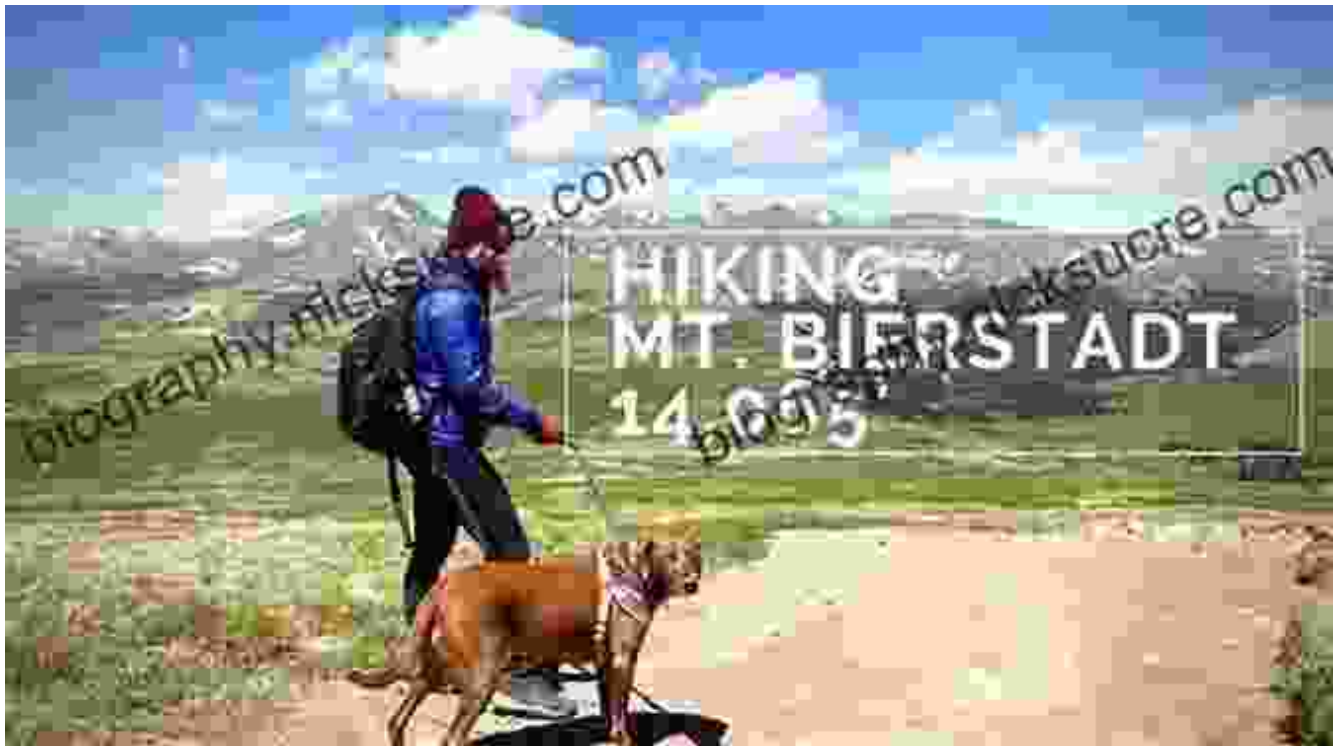
3. Mount Bierstadt

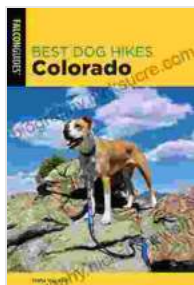
Rainbow Lakes is a great place to enjoy a picnic lunch and soak up the scenery. The lakes are a popular spot for fishing, so be sure to bring your

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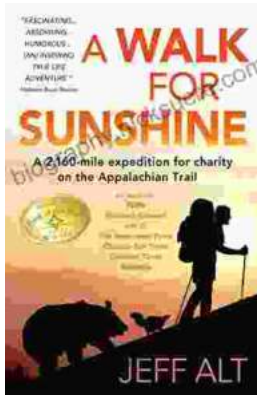
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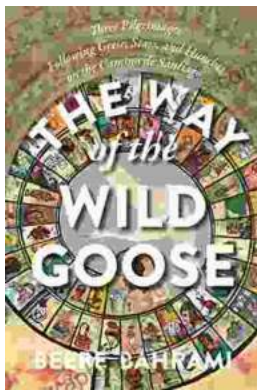
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
